






Today we highlight over 340 young artists who, for the last few months, have dedicated their time and energy to create multiple art pieces, immersive installations, and engaging activities you will experience today.




Be sure to look all around you...

Ask questions, explore, and let your curiosity shine!





CANDLELIT TRIBUTE TO CARAVAGGIO

The goal of this lesson was to learn about the 16th century Italian artist Michelangelo Merisi da Caravaggio (1571–1610) and to seek inspiration from the painting technique "chiaroscuro." In art, chiaroscuro is the use of strong contrasts between light and dark, and it translates literally to "light-dark." Artists first incorporated this technique in the Renaissance and Baroque periods of art, usually to create bold contrasts affecting a whole composition. As an intro to this concept, we looked at paintings by masters of this technique, such as Caravaggio, and paid tribute to the idea by re-imagining the candle light that would have lit the scenes and provided the artist's dramatic lighting.

OUR PLACE IN THE LINIVERSE

Young artists forged a journey towards our cosmic frontier and created celestial bodies to design their own galaxy. In our discussion on the theme, we took inspiration from astronomy maps used by sailors, by Van Gogh's infamous Starry Night and by visual artist Katie Paterson, who uses themes of celestial bodies in their artwork, such as mapping dead stars and creating a lightbulb that simulate the experience of moonlight and totality in eclipses.

SCULPTURE PARKS

CREATURES OF THE DEEP

Young artists took a chance to explore the deepest depths of the ocean. Here, the water is so deep that no sunlight can reaches, blanketing the bottom of the ocean in complete darkness. Organisms that live and survive down here create their own light with their bodies, allowing them to visibly pop amidst a sea of black. We recreated that effect by painting sea creatures you would find in these 'midnight zones,' like squid, jellyfish and anglerfish against a black canvas background.

SPRING BATIK

Young artists learned about the Indonesian tradition of creating Batik fabric and how wax is used to create a resist. This project allowed students to explore themes of "Light & Shadow" by thinking about their design in positive vs. negative space. During our discussion for this project we encouraged students to create a spring themed design that they felt represented them, all while using a limited color palette to tie all the pieces together.

Young artists created their own worlds! Vibrant realms living in unassuming tins, we explored light and shadow as a metaphor for the power of art. By harnessing their creativity through different mediums (markers, clay, felt, found objects, etc.), the tin worlds allow us to partake in the unique experiences of each artist and celebrate their voices.

BOTANICAL ILLUSTRATIO

This two-week long project's goal was to complete a nature journal and create two very different pieces of art based on observation of nature and flowers. We explored the work of two women artists of different times who gained success and financial independence through observation and passion for art. The results are watercolors in a classic, botanical illustration style and modern patterns with mixed media that let young artists use their gained knowledge of the flowers as a starting point for patterns that could easily be translated and applied to different products.
